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
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FOLIO HONORED

Oklahoma Center for the Book will present the Glenda Carlile Distinguished Service Award to FOLIO at its awards banquet on April 14 in recognition of FOLIO's Literary Landmarks project. Oklahoma has one of the most successful Literary Landmarks projects in the nation.

The Literary Landmarks program was begun in 2001 and has honored Woody Guthrie, Ralph Ellison, Lynn Riggs, Angie Debo, John Berryman, Sequoyah, Will Rogers, John Joseph Matthews, and Wilson Rawls.



Okemah was the first Literary Landmark in 2001, honoring Woody Guthrie.

The Literary Landmarks committee was cochaired by Michael Wallis and Julia Brady Ratliff from 2001 to 2007 and by Michael Wallis and Karen Neurohr from 2008 to 2010. More honorees and designated landmarks are in the planning stages.

The Glenda Carlile Distinguished Service award is presented each year to a person or group that promotes or provides service to the Oklahoma Center for the Book or promotes literary programs across the state. It is named in honor of Glenda Carlile who served as a volunteer, board member, and president of the Friends of the Oklahoma Center for the Book and as Executive Director of the Oklahoma Center for the Book from 1996 to 2009.



Pioneer Library System News

Moore Friends supported their library in the City of Moore community event "Super Bowl Bowling Party" to support the back pack program through the Regional Food Bank. It was put on by the Educational Service Committee at the Chamber of Commerce and

involved over twenty other community participants.



Friends paid for lane sponsorship with funds from their book sales. Seven staff members were able to participate due to the Friends support. The event raised over \$15,000 with lane sales and a silent auction.

The Friends felt that this participation in a community event enabled them to spread knowledge of library services while supporting partnerships with the city of Moore and the Chamber of Commerce.

In Memoriam


Helen C. White

of Moore, who taught in three different school systems during a 30-year career and was an active volunteer, died Sunday, Oct. 9, 2011. She was born Oct. 25, 1925 in Edna, OK, graduated from Bristow High School and then from



the University of Oklahoma with an education degree. She began her teaching career in Oklahoma City before taking a break to raise her two children. She returned to teaching in the Grandfield, OK school system in 1966 and finished her career in the Moore School System at Apple Creek Elementary. She was an organizer and stalwart leader of the Friends of Moore Public Library and served as president for more than a decade. She was also a valued member of the-FOLIO Board for many years.

"Fight The Internet Bad Guys And Win"

can't tell what's going on? Could someone be trying to fool you?

Why does your computer keep showing crazy virus messages, even though you just paid \$50 to renew your antivirus software? Why do windows from porno websites keep popping up, even though you've never been to a porno website in your life? Who did these things and how can they be stopped?

Computer security expert Dave Moore has the answers to all these questions and more in his free, hard-hitting and often shocking class called, "Fight the Internet Bad Guys and Win!"

Internet criminals are out there, waiting to steal your stuff, or use your computer to steal other people's stuff. In his free computer security class, Dave Moore will expose the bad guy's schemes, teaching you how to Fight the Internet Bad Guys and Win."

Beginning February, 2012, Moore will be touring Oklahoma, teaching his class at public libraries around the state. The class is one session, taught in one evening, free and open to the public. Everyone who uses a computer should take the class.



Ada Circ Desk Makes Life Easier

Through a grant from the McKoys of Ada Foundation, the Ada Public Library was able to get a new (and very impressive) circulation desk. The old desk had been in place more than a quarter century. As the decades progressed, the library saw substantial increases in traffic and staff, which meant what had once been almost adequate space had become very crowded.

The new larger desk provides custom cabinetry to serve the needs of the staff, wiring which is secured from public view (and public hands,) a granite countertop, and matching granite medallions. The new circulation desk represents a substantial upgrade for the library. The library staff no longer bangs into each other in the course of a normal work day.


National Constitution Center, and the American library Association.

BOOKS FOR CHILDREN Grant Application Guidelines

The Libri Foundation is a nationwide non-profit organization which donates new, quality, hardcover children's books to small, rural public libraries in the United States through its BOOKS FOR CHILDREN program. Only libraries within the 50 states are eligible to apply. The Libri Foundation does not offer grants to libraries outside of the United States.

Libraries are qualified on an individual basis. In general, county libraries should serve a population under 16,000 and town libraries should serve a population under 10,000 (usually under 5,000). Libraries should be in a rural area, have a limited operating budget, and an active children's department. Please note: Rural is usually considered to be at least 30 miles from a city with a population over 40,000.

Applications are accepted from independent libraries as well as libraries which are part of a county, regional, or cooperative library system. A library system may also apply if all the libraries in the system meet these requirements.

Applications are accepted from school libraries only if they also serve as the public library (i.e. it is open to everyone in the community, has some summer hours, and there is no public library in town).

A branch library may apply if the community it is in meets the definition of rural. If the branch library receives its funding from its parent institution, then the parent institution's total operating budget, not just the branch library's total operating budget, must meet the budget restrictions. Please note: Town libraries with total operating budgets over \$150,000 and county libraries with total operating budgets over \$350,000 are rarely given grants. The average total operating budget of a BOOKS FOR CHILDREN grant recipient is less than \$40,000.

BOOKS FOR CHILDREN grant recipients that have fulfilled all grant requirements, including the final report, may apply for another grant three years after the receipt of their previous grant. Grant recipients that do not fulfill all the grant requirements, including the final report, are not eligible for another grant.

There are three ways to obtain a grant application from The Libri Foundation: (1) Read the application instructions and fill out the form online. The form must be printed out, STA-PLED, signed, and returned to The Libri Foundation via mail. Link to an Adobe Acrobat PDF version of the form to print out and complete by hand or using a typewriter.

You may also request an application packet by mail, telephone, or fax at the address or phone numbers given on the Libri Foundation home page.


The next application deadline for 2012 is postmarked by May 15th. Grants will be awarded May 31st.

Claremore Friends Make Effort to Expand/Improve How They "Tell Their Story"

Friends of the Will Rogers Library in Claremore was looking for ways to attract the attention of younger parents in the community and encourage them to be members and supporters of FOL efforts at the library. FOL decided on a beginning project of providing a bookmark for every elementary child in Claremore, thinking the bookmarks would go home with the students and be noticed by Mommy and Daddy. On the front of the bookmark is a place to list the child's favorite books and the date read, and on the back are three quotes, one by Will Rogers, one by Mary Ellen Chase, and one by Walt Disney, as well as contact information for Friends.

Distribution began on February 21 when children's author Tammi Sauer began making presentations at two of the schools in Claremore - Westside Elementary and Catalayah Elementary. Friends and each school's PTO co-sponsored the presentations, and class sets of bookmarks were given to the teachers when their classes came to hear Tammi's program. The idea was very well received by both students and

teachers. Friends is also considering creating an adult bookmark to place on the checkout desk that will highlight FOL activities and FOL support for Will Rogers Library.

The Oklahoma Group Helps Nonprofits

The University of Oklahoma offers a unique opportunity for nonprofits. A student-run organization called "The Oklahoma Group" offers pro bono consulting services to nonprofits in central Oklahoma. The Friends of the Mustang Public Library were accepted as clients and are currently working with this organization.

The Oklahoma Group was founded in 2010 by six University of Oklahoma students. The association was inspired by "The Berkeley Group" which is affiliated with the University of California at Berkeley. They feel that they can help organizations that do not have enough in-house staff or funds to develop strategic plans, marketing plans, conduct surveys, etc.

Interested nonprofits apply to The Oklahoma Group asking for assistance with specific goals to improve the organization. The Group selects a maximum of six nonprofits with which to work. The Friends of the Mustang Library asked for assistance with the following:

Marketing Plan – to increase general awareness about our mission and services with the Mustang community and surrounding areas.

Membership recruitment and retention – strategies to attract more active members to the organization.

Fundraising strategies – maximize the efficiency of fundraising activities and provide for long-term financial stability.

Mustang Friends President Brett Jones and Library Director Desiree Webber have met with The Oklahoma Group to provide information and to hammer out details of the desired outcomes. The six-member team working with the Friends of the Mustang Library conducted their first on-site research during the Friends' Chocolate Festival on February 11th. The Festival was deemed a great opportunity for the team to interact with the community and to survey public opinion about the Friends of the Library activities.

The survey showed that half of the Chocolate Festival attendees are from Mustang but that most of them do not use the library regularly. In the future, the Library Director will use the Chocolate Festival and other fundraisers as an opportunity to market library services, programs and materials. The Friends of the Library will do the same in marketing its organization and membership opportunities.

The survey also asked respondents how they learned about the Chocolate Festival. Twelve percent read the announcement on the 10-foot by 4-foot LED sign in front of the community center. What needs to be marketed is that the Friends of the Mustang Library raised over half of the funds for the LED sign.


Friends President Brett Jones is interested in creating a "brand" for the Friends as part of an overall marketing campaign to increase membership, promote the Friends' activities in the area and to attain financial stability through the growth of the endowment fund. The Oklahoma Group is working on a marketing and branding plan for the Mustang Friends. A special meeting will be held the end of April 2012 to hear The Oklahoma Group's final presentation.
